


Thanks to our donors, these gifts of hope have been sent to children and communities in 17 countries and city in 2022.





For Children



These gifts equip children with skills and resources to grow up healthy, safe and happy. We delivered:



Water, Sanitation and Hygiene

- Soaps for 6,515 children living in poverty
- Menstrual hygiene kits for 800 girls



Health and Nutrition

 Nutritious food for 334 acutely malnourished children for 6 months



Child Protection

- Psychosocial support for 965 children affected by conflict
- A year's early childhood education for 1,277 internally displaced children



Education and Care

- Books for 820 students
- Bicycles for 392 children living in remote areas to travel to school with ease
- Informal education to help 181 street children prepare themselves to return to school
- Uniform and stationery for 283 out-of-school children to resume learning
- Tablets for 160 children with disability
- Wheelchairs for 60 children

• Vocational skills training for 39 out-of-school adolescents



For Families



These gifts benefit the whole family by enabling wellness and sustainable sources of income. We delivered:



WASH

- Anti-epidemic kits for 3,000 impoverished families



Health and Nutrition

- Cooking demonstration sessions for 13,270 persons to ensure children have sufficient intake of nutrients
- Nutrition & livelihood support to 675 tuberculosis patients for them to complete the treatment
- Mosquito nets to prevent fatal diseases including dengue fever and malaria for 150 families in need



Local Programme

- Food packs for 40 local grass-root families in need in Hong Kong



Livelihood

- Improved seeds for 650 impoverished households to increase harvest amidst climate change
- 500 goats, 337 cows, 164 pigs, 2,725 chickens or ducks for impoverished families
- Support for 100 persons in poverty to start up grocery stores business to diversify their income source
- Support for 130 farmers to undertake beekeeping
- Electrical sewing machines and trainings for 50 impoverished families



Disaster Risk Reduction

- Emergency items for 1,000 families affected by natural disaster

WASH

- Clean water for 15 nutrition centres
- Support for the rehabilitation of 10 boreholes and construction of 2 large-scale water facilities
- Support for the construction of $\frac{2}{2}$ latrines for school



Health and Nutrition

- Personal protective equipment for 65 nutrition centres
- Medical equipment for 18 health centres



Education and Care

- Installation of 32 solar lights for schools
- Building of 8 classrooms for schools

Construction of 2 fish ponds in school for vocational training


Improved Livelihood from Duck Rearing

In Bangladesh, 15-year-old Farzana, used to go to school with a gloomy face having not enough notebook and pen. Her father Md. Aslam is a day labourer and mother Shahinur Begum is a homemaker. Farzana has an elder brother. With no alternative income source, Farzana and her brother had to go to school without any breakfast most of the time.

Farzana's mother was selected as a beneficiary from World Vision's Gift Catalogue where she received 9 ducks for rearing. After a few months, the ducks began laying eggs. Soon, Shahinur Begum started selling the eggs in local market and was able to buy necessary notebook and pen, and pay school fees for her children. Now Farzana and her brother both go to school regularly with very happy faces. Shahinur Begum also prepares nutritious breakfast and meal with the egg for her children and family. "Now I can provide nutritious food and can manage necessary educational materials for my children," said Shahinur Begum.

Maternity Ward and Medical Equipment to Save Lives

In Tanzania, the newly constructed maternity ward and medical equipment supported by World Vision at Magazini dispensary enabled 38-year-old mother Amina to deliver safely as she received and enjoyed pre-natal and natal services from the centre. Before, the provision and utilisation of maternal newborn child health services was unsatisfactory, said Amina.

"Our dispensary had a delivery bed and one hospital bed used for antenatal and postnatal care that caused congestion, and it was difficult to monitor a mother who had just given birth while allowing another pregnant mother to have space to give birth." Christina, clinical officer narrates the prior hardship of health service provision at the dispensary. "For 2 years I had worked, 4 mothers and 5 newborns had died due to complications during delivery, attributed by the absence of maternity wards and essential maternal newborn child health medical equipment." Now, there is an increasing number of mothers who complete their antenatal care visits and give birth at the health unit. No more children die of preventable diseases, and no more pregnant women die as a result of poor maternal newborn child health services ever since then.
